




School begins Wednesday, August 28th at 8:15am. Pray for all our students and staff as we open the doors to the 2019-2020 school year.

All of us heard about the devastating floods that ravaged Nebraska this year. The state suffered the worst damage in Nebraska history. Good Shepard Lutheran Church helped in the aftermath

but is now looking for volunteers ages 14 and up to help Nebraska rebuild. Project Restore which has received a \$135,000 grant from LCMS World Relief is providing, tools, housing, training, and safety equipment for volunteers willing to come and help. In addition, the church says that most of the volunteers meals will be provided as well. The only cost to the volunteers is their transportation to and from the site.

Our congregation has a great record of helping communities that have suffered a loss. That is one tradition I am anxious to continue. Project Restore will be continuing for at least a year. I have contacted Pastor Ryan and he said they need help in every season, yet the majority of volunteers come in the summer. 
